1. Meeting convened at 9:22am
2. Welcome by Amanda Patania and Carolyn Lyon

Carolyn Lyon thanked Hospitality Committee for the bus driver's breakfast held at Comstock. They absolutely love this event and we are one of the only towns that offer this type of event.

The PTA is still in need of filling the positions of Secretary, Treasurer, Co-President, Visiting Author co-chair, and various other committee positions.

Amanda Patania announced that the Box Tops Competition just began on March 11th and will run for 2 weeks.

3. Principal's Report- Dr. Jennifer Falcone

The LLC will be undergoing some major cosmetic renovations this summer. Thank you to the PTA for generously donating some funds to help this project.

Wilton Reads Project: Cider Mill students will be read "Whispering Town" by Jennifer Elvgren which is an age-appropriate picture book that discusses survivors of the Holocaust.

*Tara Raniolo questioned if all grades would be listening to the same book. Dr. Mitchell said "Yes, all student will hear the same story and we will also be having a school-wide author presentation on April 4th."

*Carolyn Lyon and Amanda Patania suggested that there be a step-by-step tutorial for parents to follow. The PowerSchool website and App are totally different, and parents may not understand what needs to be updated and how.

*Vanessa Elias commented that there are many issues with the snow day phone calls. Dr. Falcone noted that PowerSchool can be updated so only certain phone numbers can receive the calls. Vanessa also asked if PowerSchool and MobileArq have all the same information. NO, they do not.

4. PTA Teacher Representative- Diane Strickrodt on behalf of Cheryl Ryder

5. Guest Speaker: Officer Diane MacLean, School Resource Officer

She has been in the Wilton Police Department for 19 years, she moved into the SRO position as the department felt 2 officers were needed based on society changes (social media, increase in drug/alcohol). She works M-F 7:00am-3:00pm mostly in Middlebrook and Cider Mill. Rich Ross is the High School SRO.

They handle all calls related to persons 18 years of age and younger in the town of Wilton. If issues arise at their homes, they will follow-up at school to make sure everything is good. This can include calls ranging from family illness to abuse.

She stressed that she is not at the school as a disciplinarian. She is there to bridge the gap between kids and police, build a relationship and educate. She will help with certain situations that are brought to school from home. She works closely with the guidance departments, social workers, school psychologists.

She teaches classes in both schools including a class for 2nd graders at Miller Driscoll.

2nd Grade: Stranger Danger

3rd – 5th: Bullying, Intro to Internet Safety, Rules vs. Laws, Peer Pressure

6th: 3-day Internet Safety Course discussing predators and how to keep yourself safe online. Compares social media to Halloween. Everyone has masks on and you need to be careful of who is behind that mask. Advises to shut down devices at night just like you do the doors to your house. Online predators work at all hours.

7th: Drugs, Alcohol, and Vaping

She complete certifications every 2 years to stay on top of the ever-changing issues we face in society. She recently had Gang Training and was completely shocked at how much violent video games and social media videos play out in real life. She wants to find a way to bring information to the parents of the community rather than just educating the students on these types of issues.

Q & A:

Kara Berghaus: Thanked her for all she is doing to keep our schools safe. Relating to the gang training, it is a good idea to teach our students the flip-side of life. They need to know that there is much more out there than the comforts of Wilton.

Vanessa Elias: Suggested we create a “SRO Block” to all school newsletters. Also, put a link to the SRO Information no the Wilton Police Department Website. Catherine O’Keefe to create a blurb for the Principal Newsletters re: Officer MacLean’s role in Cider Mill

Ritu Malik: Walks track with kids and always finds alcohol containers lying around. How can we prevent that?

DM: There really is no way to prevent it. It is a hard issue to tackle because once police start patrolling one area, people will just find another area to loiter and leave trash. If you see a bunch of alcohol containers in certain areas, please contact WPD and advise them.

Carolyn Lyon: Question from concerned parent- On Fridays, when all administration are at a meeting, how is that keeping our building safe if there were to be an emergency situation?

DM: This really is not a police issue, it is an education issue. I will tell you that there are other members of the school in place that are very well trained to do exactly what the administration would do in emergency situations. All teachers and staff are trained in emergency procedures regardless if the administrator is in the building or not.

Carolyn Lyon: After school hours, are buildings monitored?

DM: After Sandy Hook, a Security Task Force was formed and they work on some great training to keep community buildings safe. Wilton has security cameras in place that directly feed into the WPD. They do random building checks and perimeter checks. WPD is very aware of what vehicles should be where and what times throughout the entire day/evenings and after hours. They maintain a relationship with the custodial staff to communicate anything out of place and report it immediately.
